Rationale	What is a lyric poem? And, given the broad variation and wild experimentation that characterize modern American poetry, how can we define, or even describe, the modern American lyric? Addressing these questions is the goal of this course, and we'll approach from two dovetailing directions. First, we'll read significant works in lyric theory written by American literary critics and scholars from New Criticism on. Second, we'll read lyric poems by modern American poets that take up these same questions <i>ars poetically</i> , in and by means of poetry. This course will familiarize students with modern debates in lyric theory and give you more background in modern American poetry. But it will also prompt students to investigate not just aesthetic and poetic categories and criteria, but also more general intellectual ones, including what counts as thinking and theorization in the first place, and why.
