Overview:

English 102 builds on the skills that you have gained from English 101 or its equivalent. This course focuses on rhetoric, writing, argument and research. Besides meeting in class, you will also use eCampus for posting your thoughts and interacting with other class remembers. You will also have opportunities to experiment with multimodal composition in some projects.

COURSE GOALS

- 4. Demonstrate Knowledge of Writing Conventions
- 5. Develop Knowledge of Writing in Digital Environments.
