INTRODUCTION:

Welcome to English 101! This course focuses on developing your knowledge of writing in several areas beyond mere grammar and punctuation. We will examine how we use writing to express personal ideas. We will practice using writing to learn new things. We will explore how writing can change depending on audience. We will analyze how different types of communication like cartoons or music are a type of writing—or composing—that make meaning in people's lives. Finally, we will develop a richer sense of how research and form can give your writing power and purpose. The goal is not to convert you all into English majors. Instead, it is to help you become more aware of how language influences your personal, professional, academic, and civic lives, and how your knowledge of language and writing can positively impact those spheres.

COURSE GOALS: This course fulfills objective one of the General Education Curriculum at West Virginia University—to communicate effectively in English. English 101 accomplishes this through four course-specific goals. Each student can expect to

- 1) Develop a personal learning process for effective writing
- 2) Recognize contexts that shape writing and research
- 3) Think critically to understand texts, contexts, and writing strategies
- 4) Know the rules for effective communication, whether those are style or genre conventions, rules for grammar and punctuation, or rules for recognizing sources with correct research citations

POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

Attendance and Late Arrivals: You must attend class. We know that personal
situations and required university events may, on a rare occasion, make it
impossible for you to be in class. For these reasons you are allowed two
absences. The third absence will compromise your grade as much as one full
letter. Each subsequent absence will result in the further loss of up to one letter
grade. Thus, students who miss six classes will fail the course.

All absences will count toward the total number allowed, and this policy goes into effect from the moment you are registered in the course. If you know in advance that you will miss more than two consecutive class meetings or more than four meetings in a single semester, you should take the course in another term.

Throughout the semester, we will have four conferences in Colson 242. Conference days are treated as regular class days for attendance purposes. If you miss a conference, you will be counted absent that day.

Arriving late disrupts the class. Lateness is defined as arriving 5 minutes or later past the course start time. If you arrive late four times, I will record that pattern as an absence.

Late Work: I do not accept late work. If you miss either a draft or a final
deadline, that work will not be eligible for full credit in your final portfolio. Missed
in-class activities and informal writing assignments cannot be made up and will
receive a zero. If you know in advance that you will miss class, please try to
email me beforehand and upload your work to eCampus.

In the case of student illness or personal emergency, please contact me and you may be able to negotiate a special arrangement. Such arrangements are rare and require a formal, written request that must include an explanation of the circumstances, documentation (if relevant), and a detailed plan for completing missed work. Submitting a formal request does not automatically guarantee that the request will be granted.

- Cheating/Plagiarism: The English 101 community assumes your honesty and that you will turn in original work. Failing to do so may result in a failing grade for a paper, a failing grade for the course, or a more serious penalty. If you have any questions about when and how to document sources, or any other question that will help you avoid unintentional plagiarism (including self-plagiarism), please talk to me. - Computers and Cell Phones: You are welcome to bring laptop computers and other electronic devices that support your educational endeavors into the classroom. If at any time these devices become a distraction to me or other members of the class, you will be asked to put them away.

Because we will spend much of our time in a computer classroom, I expect you to be familiar with the "Computer Classroom Best Practices" found on page xxvii in *WiP*. Misuse of computer technology, including checking Facebook or otherwise using the computer for purposes unrelated to our class, will result in a lowered participation grade. If you continue to use the computer inappropriately, I may ask you to leave the classroom and you will be counted absent that day.

All mobile phones should be turned off or set to a silent mode. If your cell phone disrupts the class, your participation grade will be lowered. If you continue to use

your cell phone, I may ask you to leave the classroom and you will be considered absent that day.

If you must take a phone call due to an emergency, please quietly excuse yourself from the room.

- Document Retention: For your records, make a photocopy, a backup electronic copy, or other appropriate documentation of each project before submitting the original for review and evaluation. Technological glitches will occur, and it is your responsibility to be prepared for them. Because you will be asked to reflect on your progress throughout the semester, be sure to save all essays and projects that you complete.

You will turn in short writing assignments and major projects on eCampus. - Multi-Angle Personal Narrative (5-6 pages)
- Feature Article (4-5 pages)
- Text Analysis (5-6 pages)
- Stakeholder Research Paper (6 pages)

Informal Writing (Short Writes, Homework, & Quizzes) = 20% Participation = 10%
