#### Introduction

This course focuses on developing your knowledge of writing and your skills as a writer. We will examine how and why writing works in a variety of situations, and we will learn how to enrich our writing through research, analysis, and an understanding of our audiences. The goal of this course is not to convert you into an English major. Instead, it is to help you begin to develop the skills you need to write in a variety of situations and contexts, whether personal, academic, or professional. This course will help prepare you for English 102, the rest of your college career, and your professional life beyond college. Learning to write well is a lifelong process. English 101 is just the beginning.

#### **Course Goals**

This course fulfills objective 1 of the General Education Curriculum (GEC) at West Virginia University—to communicate effectively in English. English 101 accomplishes this through four course-specific goals. You can expect to:

- 1. Develop a personal learning process for effective writing,
- 2. Recognize contexts that shape writing and research,
- 3. Think critically to understand texts, contexts, and writing strategies, and
- 4. Know the rules for effective communication, whether those are style or genre conventions, rules for grammar and punctuation, or rules for recognizing sources with correct research citations.
