COURSE OVERVIEW:

The purpose of this class is to help you develop your abilities to compose and analyze texts. By the end of the semester you should feel that you have increased your ability to write in a variety of styles, research from numerous sources, as well as the ability to read and think critically. The class should also help you develop your ability to communicate effectively in a variety of different ways. Additionally, in this particular class we will explore issues related to space, place, and memory. Therefore, while you will still have a great deal of freedom in how you approach your major writing assignments, each will be focused through this lens. Since this is a portfolio class, participating in each step of the writing process is absolutely necessary. This places an extreme emphasis on attendance, participation, and effort.

Social Justice: I support West Virginia University's commitment to social justice. As a classroom we will work to create a positive learning environment based on open communication and mutual respect. I welcome your suggestions to help us meet this commitment.

Attendance: The English Department sets the attendance policy for all 101 classes. You may miss no more than three class periods before your absences will impact your overall course grade. Each absence after the third will compromise your overall grade by one full letter and at six absences you will fail the course. Medical and family emergencies, even with documentation, are not excused. In the event that class is canceled for conferences you are expected to attend the conference at the time that you selected, failure to attend will be counted as an absence. Extreme tardiness for class or conferences may also be counted as an absence. If you have not completed the work due for class, you will likely be asked to leave and counted as absent for the day. If you frequently arrive to class late, or have to leave early, it may count as an absence. Regardless of absences, it is your responsibility to make sure that work is turned in on the date that it is due. It is also your responsibility to find out what you have missed in the event that you are absent.

Electronic Devices: With the exceptions of documented needs that have been cleared with me in advance, you do not need to bring any electronic devices to class. **Electronic devices (cell phones, laptops, iPods, etc.) need to be turned off and put in your bag.** If after class starts I see (or hear) any of these devices I will mark you absent for the day. Since I consider this behavior disruptive I will not further disrupt class. If you do not want to be marked absent please turn off your cell phone during class and put it in your bag. Please see me before class if an emergency arises in which you will need to have your cell phone on and we can make arrangements.

Academic Integrity: Plagiarism, cheating, and fraud are serious offenses. The minimum penalty for academic dishonesty is an **F** (zero credit) on the work in question. Clear cases will result in an unforgivable **F** for the course and appropriate academic discipline.

Homework: Daily assignments will not be accepted late. For major papers, every class period the paper is late will result in a half letter grade cap being placed on the paper. Therefore, if you turn in a major paper a class late and it would normally have received a B letter grade, it will receive a B-, and the cap will continue to impact that paper even after revisions. If you have a problem with a particular assignment, and you let me know <u>in advance</u> of its due date, we may be able to negotiate an extension. If you have additional questions about what I mean by "in advance" please see me.

Food/Drink: On days that we are in the computer lab (Clark 410) NO FOOD OR DRINKS are permitted.

STANDARD OF WORK:

Writing assignments that are done outside of class are expected to be typed and have standard formatting (left-hand, four-line, single-spaced header; double spaced; 1" margins; no additional spacing between lines; and 12pt., Times New Roman font). If you do not know how to make any of these formatting adjustments to your paper, it is your responsibility to seek me out before any assignments are due. Any paper that fails to follow the format guidelines above will be penalized; in some cases (e.g. when format impedes the ability to read your work, or when format has clearly been manipulated to obscure a failure to meet length requirements) papers may be returned until they are correctly formatted.

You will be expected to write (and rewrite) four major papers in 101. Additionally, you will be given readings and short writing assignments both in and out of class. You will be expected to participate *every* day, complete all assignments, and truly rethink and revise your writing. Revision is crucial to this course; you are expected to use peer and instructor feedback to become a skilled editor of your own work. This is a college level course, and you are expected to be comfortable with the mechanics of writing: comprehension and use of proper grammar, syntax, and punctuation. *Easy Writer* offers guidelines and activities to help you with these mechanics. If you feel at any point that you need, or would like, additional help with writing, writing mechanics, or any of the assignments given in this class the Writing Center is another excellent resource. Final Portfolio: Your final portfolio reflects all of the writing that you have done in 101. It will include, among other things, post-"Final For Now" revisions of the four major papers and a Final Draft of each paper.

Informal Writing: I will ask that you keep a journal of informal writing during this class. This journal will be a space for you to keep any ungraded writing you have done for the class (free writing, reading and class notes, brainstorming, etc.). Journals will be collected randomly throughout the semester, and at the end of the semester you will be expected to have a minimum of forty, full journal pages. As an incentive to take notes, journals can be kept open during quizzes.

Short Writes: I will always try to return your Short Write (SW) assignments within two class periods of their due date. Short writes should be a minimum of one full page; however, in order to fully answer the question(s) you will likely need to write more. Nonetheless, while I have no maximum limit, no short write should require more than two full pages.

Space Disruption Assignment and Presentation: As part of your short write grade you will be given a mini-project early in the semester. This project will ask you to work in teams, to design and perform an experiment outside of class, and to give a brief presentation to the class at the end of the semester.

Participation: I expect you to come to class with the assignments and/or reading completed, as it will be impossible to participate fully in the class without doing so. Participation as a grade is a reflection of the attention and effort you give to the readings, class discussions, free writes, small group work, and peer review. Participation is incredibly important to your overall success in this class. If you have concerns about your ability to succeed in activities, such as class discussion because you do not like speaking in front of groups, please see me as soon as possible.

Conferences: Conferences are a time for you to speak with me about the current paper we are working on in class. Conference time is limited and I expect you to come prepared. This means bringing a current draft of your paper with specific problems and questions that you want addressed. The expectation is that you will lead the conference. It is unacceptable to come to conferences unprepared and doing so will result in you being marked absent.
