Course Objectives

- Building an original research essay in the field of literary and cultural studies, in which you will demonstrate: an awareness of academic conversations; skills in research, interpretation and argumentation; an appropriate tone and style; a command of documentation conventions
- Reinforcing the goals of previous writing and literature courses: generating and refining a topic; finding, evaluating and incorporating research sources; constructing a critical argument; revising for style and structure
- Gaining confidence in giving and responding to constructive criticism

Prerequisites

- English 101 and 102 (or the equivalent)
- At least one 300-level English course, preferably in literary or cultural studies

Requirements

- Attendance at all class sessions. More than three unexcused absences will result in a failing grade.
- Frequent one-page exercises, on assorted tasks leading up to the final paper. These exercises, approximately one per week, are to be completed at home and submitted at the beginning of the following class. Missed exercises cannot be made up and will be recorded as a "zero." Collectively, approx. 15% of course grade.
- This course will culminate in an original, properly documented literary research paper of approx. 20 pages. The research paper will constitute approx. 70% of your course grade. Of this portion, the initial prospectus will count 5%, the annotated bibliography 15%, the 10-page version of the paper 25%, the revised prospectus 5% and the 20-page version 50%. The 10-and 20-page versions will each be weighted 25% for the rough draft, 75% for the final draft. Each draft will receive a separate grade for style (30%), content (50%) and accuracy of documentation (20%).
- Your overall attitude, class participation, contribution to workshops, etc. will make up the remaining 15% of your course grade.
