

### Overview

American literature of this period is a vast and diverse body of material. This course does not attempt an exhaustive survey, but rather focuses on three topics of perennial importance:

Contact and Conflict—European colonizers' interactions with indigenous Americans;

Nature—colonizers' interactions with the physical environment;

Liberty—interactions within the social order(s) established by the colonizers.

Your goal for the course is to understand the historical development of each of these topics as manifested in the readings. You will demonstrate this understanding through guizzes and exams.

#### **Text**

Nina Baym, ed., *The Norton Anthology of American Literature*, 7th edition, Volumes A (Beginnings to 1820) and B (1820-1865).

Bring your book to class every day!
