#### RATIONALE AND COURSE POLICIES

The course surveys the life and work of the poet and playwright William Shakespeare (1564-1616). We will read and discuss nine plays and some short scenes. The course offers a fresh evaluation of the most important writer in the English language; his plays exhibit an unparalleled facility with language, intelligence, playfulness, compassion and creativity. Shakespeare lived only two sovereigns (Elizabeth I and James I) during the most exciting period of English history, when England participated in the radical experiments of the Renaissance and Protestant Reformation.

**TEXTS:** There are two required texts: David Bevington's exemplary edition of Shakespeare's works (now in its 7<sup>th</sup> edition—but earlier used editions of Bevington will be fine) and Roger Warren's reconstructed text of Shakespeare's collaboration with George Wilkins on his first romance, *Pericles*. (This text differs sharply from the standard version.) ALWAYS BRING THE BEVINGTON EDITION TO CLASS, except for the discussions of *Pericles*—and be prepared to read aloud.

**POLICIES:** Regular attendance is expected, and active participation is a key component of your final grade; as on the job, attendance will be recorded. Your grade will drop after THREE ABSENCES. I may schedule occasional visits to the large Audio-Visual classroom in the basement of Wise Library; attendance at these sessions is crucial, as there will be questions on the filmed versions in the quizzes. Papers, quizzes and exams are due on the dates listed above. Do not send papers as e-mail attachments or leave voice messages, but feel free to send questions via e-mail. I accept WVU's Social Justice statement.

**GRADING:** Your grade will be calculated on the basis of points: Final exam 20 points; *Pericles* paper 10 points; exam 20 points; five quizzes 10 points each; for perfect attendance, add 5 points.
