#### **Introduction:**

This course builds on the writing and critical thinking skills that you developed in English 101. Working on the classical and modern techniques of argumentation, the course introduces you with common fallacies and the ways of seeing and avoiding them. Since critical thinking and effective writing skills are closely connected with active close reading skills, the course has a number reading assignments. Besides the standard writing process of invention, drafting and completion, the course leads you through a systematic research process to writing a researched argumentative essay and its oral presentation.

Course Goals: Our class has five major goals. Each student can expect to:

- 1) Understand writing as a process
- 2) Argue effectively and persuasively in a variety of contexts
- 3) Explore and evaluate ideas
- 4) Integrate research effectively
- 5) Understand the underlying rules of writing.

Activities such as inventing, drafting, discussing reading and writings, and peer workshops cannot be performed at home. For this reason, the English Department has instituted a strict attendance policy for all sections of English 102. You may miss up to **three** classes without penalty. Please choose these three absences wisely. Each additional absence will lower your final grade by an additional letter grade; thus **six or more** absences results in a failing grade. Chronic or excessive tardiness will also lower your grade, as will active disengagement or coming to class unprepared. Missing a conference will also constitute an absence. If you participate in a sport or some other university sanctioned event or activity that requires you to miss class, *do not* take this course during your travel season.

<u>Late Formal Paper Policy</u>: Late papers are not acceptable except under extraordinary circumstances and after prearranged negotiations with the instructor.

<u>Cell Phone Policy</u>: Please make sure that your cell phone is **off** during class. If your cell phone or similar device does disturb the class, the class participation portion of your final grade will be lowered.

<u>Social Justice Discourse Policy</u>: English 102 supports the university's commitment to social justice. We will be examining ideas from diverse perspectives this semester through our readings, writings, and discussions. Please be respectful of others. Racism, sexism, heterosexism, and other forms of discrimination will not be tolerated.

Academic Integrity: As stated before, one of the primary goals of this course is to help you develop your skills as a writer. We cannot do that if the thoughts presented in your writing are not your own. I want to hear **your** thoughts in order to help you develop your writing. Have confidence in yourself and in your words and ideas. Academic dishonesty includes, but is not limited to, cheating, plagiarizing and fabricating information or citations, facilitating acts of academic dishonesty by others, submitting work of another person or work previously used in other courses, or tampering with the academic work of other students. If you are caught committing any form of academic dishonesty (willful or accidental) you will receive an F for this course and appropriate disciplinary actions will be taken.

On Accommodations: Please speak with me if you have a documented learning disability and anticipate needing any type of accommodation in this course. Also, be aware of the support services available through the Office of Disability Services located in G30 Mountainlair.

#### **Response and Evaluation:**

Participation (10%): Participation in this course involves coming to class prepared and on time as well as taking an active role in course activities and discussions. This is a course that relies on class discussion and you cannot learn if you are not paying attention, playing on your phone, sleeping, working on homework for other courses, or listening to your MP3 player. If you are caught doing any of those things, or if you hinder class discussion or fail to prepare adequately for class you will be marked absent and asked to leave. Spirited participation may help borderline grades, just as failure to participate may hinder them. Part of your participation grade will be based on the quantity and quality of feedback you give to your fellow students in peer review. A minimum of one entire class period will be devoted to each peer review assignment.

<u>Informal Writing (20%)</u>: There will be a number of short write assignments over the course of the semester. These may include, but are not limited to, homework, in-class writing, reflections, pre-writes, freewrites, and journal entries. These short writes will be graded on quantity, relevance, and regularity.

<u>Final Portfolio (70%)</u>: Your portfolio will include: Ad analysis (4+ pages), Editorial analysis (4+ pages), Midterm Reflective memo (2+ pages), Research proposal (3+ pages), Annotated bibliography (10 entries), Argumentative essay (6-8 pages), and Final reflective memo (3 pages). Submit these writings as refined as possible. The portfolio will be graded according to the overall quality of the writing, taking into account the course goals, the effort put into revision, and the grading rubrics listed in the textbook.

## Standard of Work

This is a college level course, and you are expected to be comfortable with the mechanics of writing; that is, to understand and use proper grammar, syntax, and punctuation in order to communicate effectively. The Easy Writer offers guidelines and activities to help you with these mechanics. The Writing Center is another resource available to you—to help you to brush up on your understanding of basic skills, but also to support you in all aspects of the writing process.
