INTRODUCTION

Welcome to English 101. This course focuses on developing your knowledge of writing in several areas beyond mere grammar and punctuation. We will examine how we use writing to express personal ideas. We will practice using writing to learn new things. We will explore how writing can change depending who you write to. We will analyze how different types of communication like cartoons or music are a type of writing or composing—that make meaning in people's lives. Finally, we will develop a richer sense of how research and form can give your writing power and purpose. The goal is not to convert you all into English majors. Instead, it is to help you be more aware of how language influences your personal, professional, academic, and civic lives, and how your knowledge of language and writing can positively impact those spheres.

CLASSROOM SCHEDULE

We will alternate weekly between a computer lab and a traditional classroom. Please pay attention to your work schedule at the end of this syllabus to know where will be on any given day. All classes will be held in Clark Hall. Our computer lab is room 404, and our classroom is room 206.

OFFICE HOURS

My office hours are Mondays from 12:30PM – 3:00PM in my office in Colson Hall (Downtown Campus). Office hours provide us with an opportunity to discuss your work one on one. You may come to my office during these times or make an appointment with me to talk about any questions or comments you have about your progress in the course. I'd be happy to talk with you via e-mail as well, and you can expect that I will respond to you via e-mail within 24 hours. Please do not e-mail me the day before an assignment is due and expect to receive a response on time. Always allow 24 hours for an e-mail response to inquiries regarding class assignments.

COURSE GOALS

This course fulfills objective one of the General Education Curriculum at West Virginia University—to communicate effectively in English. English 101 accomplishes this through four course-specific goals. Each student can expect to

- 1) Know the context.
- 2) Think critically.
- 3) Learn processes for writing, revision, and reflection.
- 4) Know the rules for effective communication, whether those are style or genre conventions, rules for grammar and punctuation, or rules for recognizing sources with correct research citations.

POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

This is a portfolio-based class, which means you will not receive a letter grade on each individual assignment, but you will receive lots of feedback along with an overall letter grade at the midterm point and again at the end of the semester. Your mid-term and final grades are based on the following percentages:

Portfolio (base on major assignments and reflective writing) = 70%

- Multi-Angle Personal Narrative (5-6 pages)
- Feature Article (4-5 pages)
- Textual Analysis (5-6 pages)
- Stakeholder Research Paper (6 pages)

Short Writing Assignments & Homework = 20%Participation = 10%

ABOUT YOUR WORK:

- All four major papers with cover letters will be due by 11:59pm on the date specified. The "Final for Now" draft and the cover letter must be uploaded to eCampus. Late work is unacceptable. Please read *Work in Progress* p. xxiii for a complete discussion about late work. Your informal writing assignments will be due in class unless otherwise specified. All informal assignments (short writes) are expected to be 1-2 pages, double spaced, typed, with one inch margins. Portfolios are due in class. (We will discuss this thoroughly when we cover the portfolio process.)
- A portion of your work will be comprised of personal experiences and reflections. Please remember that as an instructor, I will read your work, and as your peers, other students in the class will read

your work. While I encourage you to write meaningful and thoughtful narratives, please keep in mind that what you write will be read by others.

- Your best work will likely be on topics that you want to write about. If you are interested in the topic, or the topic is meaningful to you, it will show in your work. Keep this in mind when choosing a topic for your writing assignments.
- One of the most effective ways to become a better writer is to read. We will read examples of different types of writing throughout the semester, but I encourage you to also read something (a magazine, a newspaper, a blog post, a novel, even the back of the shampoo bottle when you're bored in the bathroom) every day.

CLASSROOM CONDUCT

Important aspects of English 101 are learning to think critically about the world around us and also learning to view issues from multiple perspectives. In doing so, we are likely to cover topics that reveal differences of opinion within the classroom. While I encourage each student to explore and share his or her personal beliefs and world views, it is imperative that we create a safe and open community to do so; therefore, all hate speech is prohibited.
