To understand writing as a process, to argue effectively and persuasively in a variety of contexts, to explore and evaluate ideas, to integrate research effectively, and to know the rules. Review *Joining Academic Conversations (JAC)* on pages x-xi for more detailed descriptions of these goals.

Paper 1: Analysis Assignment 5+ pages\*

<u>Paper 2: Debate Assignment 5+ pages\*</u>—Beginning to integrate research while exploring all sides to an issue <u>Paper 3: Research Proposal 2+ pages</u>—Proposing a research issue

Annotated Bibliography 3+ pages—Research for Position Paper compiled in MLA format

Paper 4: Researched Position Paper 7+ pages\*—on the proposed issue

Midterm and Final Reflection Memos 2+ pages each—A self-evaluation to the course and your work in it Homework and Reading Journal—You will have 6 shorter writing assignments (2+ pages typed, double spaced); they will serve as pre-writing to the larger papers. You will also need to keep a journal entry for every reading we do for class (11-15 readings, 1 page each, handwritten). I will collect these journals once at midterm and again with your final portfolio. I will have a hand-out that goes into more details about the journal.

<u>Presentation</u>—A 5-8 minute presentation of your Researched Position Paper as well as a discussion board posting to your peers' presentations.

On-line and In-class Peer Review Responses 1+ page—Your careful and thoughtful responses to your peers' work

(All papers marked with an \* may be revised after the "Final For Now" grade has been given and resubmitted in the Final Portfolio—See "Portfolio System" below for more information.)

### Grading:

Final Portfolio 70%

Participation, Presentation and Peer Review 10%

Short Write Journal 20%

At midterm, you will submit a working portfolio of the work you've completed at that point in the semester. I'll give you an in-progress grade (A-F) at that point with comments about revision, participation and attendance to give you some idea how you are progressing in the course.

## Attendance and Tardiness:

Please be aware that if you miss more than three classes from this course, your grade will drop one letter grade. If you miss six classes, you will fail. If you miss the Library Day, that will count as two absences. If you miss an individual conference that will count as two absences as I have to cancel class to accommodate every student. For every fourth tardy you acquire, that counts as one absence. I do not differentiate between "excused" and "not excused" absences—that is why you may miss one class without your grade being jeopardized.

### Late Work:

I do not accept late work. I do not accept e-mailed work or work submitted to my office mailbox unless I have made arrangements with you to do so. Please familiarize yourself with the computer labs and copy centers on campus. Make friends with someone in this class; exchange e-mail addresses so you can contact them if you happen to miss class. Do not wait until the morning the assignment is due to print it off or photocopy it, because I will not accept any printer problems as an excuse. I will, however, be willing to discuss any deadlines and/or questions you have about an assignment or a foreseeable absence so long as it is *before the deadline has passed.*

# Portfolio System:

Writing is rarely, if ever, perfect if a person never returns to his or her work to revise. I want your work in this class to be the best it can be, so that means we will be spending a lot of time writing in drafts. For every major assignment you will write: a Peer Review Draft, Conference Draft and a Final for Now Draft. I will give you a letter grade on your Final for Now Draft and then you will have the opportunity to continue to revise that particular paper until the end of the semester when you will turn it in to the Final Portfolio. Because I see your Peer Review Draft, Conference Draft and then comment extensively on your Final for Now, I will refer you to other classmates, the Writing Center or the Term Paper Clinic to receive feedback beyond the Final for Now. (The Annotated Bibliography, Homework and Reading Journal, Presentation, Peer Review Responses, Midterm and Final Reflection Memos, and In-Class writing are *not eligible* for revision. The Research Proposal is only eligible for revision if you change your research topic at any point, in which case, revision is mandatory.) Writing is a process, one I hope you will come to understand and grow more confident in as you see your work improve with every draft. Because you will submit a Final Portfolio at the end of the semester for 70% of your grade, it is important that you save everything you write for this class: from in-class brainstorming, to peer reviewed drafts of your major assignments, to Short Writes, etc. In addition to saving everything, make sure you label all your work clearly so that both you and I can distinguish between what's a Peer Review Draft and a Conference draft, for example. Keep everything. Stay organized.
