
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English 131 — CLC Plone

Stapled in the upper left corner. Unstapled papers won't be accepted.

One inch margins on all sides.

Page numbers on each page after the first.

Double-space the text.

Use a 'works cited page' as needed.

In-class papers should be in black or blue ink and double spaced. Use a standard 8.5 x 11" blue book. Use only the front of the page.

Turning in Assignments & Late Work: Assignments must be given to me at the beginning of class in which they're due. At the end of this syllabus is a one time use only "Late Work Coupon." Week 1:

08/22: Introduction to the Course. Discuss the syllabus.

08/24: Lecture on the Classical period & ancient poetry & drama.

Discuss Aristotle's *Poetics* (specific sections).

Assignment: Read: Poetics (1-20).

08/26: Discussion on Aristotle continued. Commentary on *Metamorphosis, The Iliad, The Odyssey,* & The *Aeneid*.

Assignment: Read: Poetics (20-30, 39-49).

Week 2:

08/29: Reading discussed. Lecture continued.

Assignment: Read Sophocles: Oedipus Rex (Gardner 1-45).

08/31: Lecture on Sophocles: *Oedipus Rex.*

Assignment: go through Aristotle and parallely study Sophocles.

09/02: In-class lecture on Sophocles continued. Concluding thoughts on Attic tragedy: Aeschylus, Euripedes. Be prepared for possible quiz.

Week 3:

09/05: Labor Day Recess. No class.

09/07: Introduction to the Middle Ages (476-1450 [476-1150 = Dark Ages; 1150-1450 = Medieval Period]).

Lecture on the medieval period, including religious drama (mystery, allegories & miracle plays); difference between the epic and the romance (or Breton lais/lays).

Assignment: Go through class handout; reading journal #1 discussed.

09/09: Discuss reading. Introduction to Renaissance drama. Commentary on Ben Jonson (Volpone); Marlowe (*Doctor Faustus*). Shakespearean plays introduced.

Assignment: Go through lecture notes; read: *Hamlet* (Gardner 91-212); Reading Journal # 1 due 09/12.

Week 4:

09/12: Discuss *Hamlet*. Lecture. Reading journal due.

09/14: *Hamlet* continued. Other Shakespearean plays commented upon.

Assignment: go through class notes.

09/16: Commentary on the state of drama following the Elizabethan period. Lecture on the Modern & Contemporary periods. Introduction to Ibsen's *A Doll's House*.

Assignment: Read Ibsen's *A Doll's House* (Gardner 213-271). Be prepared for possible quiz.

Week 5:

09/19: Class discussion on Ibsen. Introduction to Arthur Miller's *Death of a Salesman*.

Assignment: Read Miller (Gardner 390-469).

09/21: Discussion on *Death of a Salesman*. Topic of Essay #1 given out in class. Due 09/28.

Assignment: thoughts on the short essay paper, be prepared to share it with the class.

09/23: Introduction to theater of the Absurd and Samuel Beckett's *Endgame*.

Assignment: Read Endgame (Gardner 470-532).

Week 6:

09/26: Discuss Beckett. Wrap up drama discussion.

Assignment: Read drama selected and read/discussed, class notes, plays covered to be prepared for an in-class discussion session before midterm.

09/28: Essay #1 due. Introduction to poetry. Elements of poetry discussed in class.

Assignment: Read Rules for the Dance (3-49).

09/30: Discuss reading. Midterm exam handed out. Due 10/07, no exceptions. Discussion on versification. Also refer The Norton Anthology (2027-2051).

Assignment: Read Rules for the Dance (50-64, 87-99).

Week 7:

10/03: Practice scansion exercises in class.

Assignment: Scansion exercise due. Revisit class lecture on versification.

10/05: Introduction to Old English (O.E.) Poetry. Epic, elegiac, riddles, religious poetry discussed.Selections from *Beowulf*.

Assignment: Read assigned selection.

10/07: Midterm due. Discussion on *Beowulf*. Introduction to O.E. religious poetry; *Cædmon's Hymn*.

Assignment: Read *Cædmon's Hymn*.

Week 8:

10/10: Discussion on *Cædmon's Hymn; *Commentary on* Everyman*.

Assignment: Read selections from Chaucer's *The Canterbury Tales*: special ref. to The General Prologue (Norton 19-38).

10/12: Discussion on The General Prologue.

Assignment: Be prepared for possible unannounced quiz.

10/14: Class lecture continued. Introduction to Shakespeare's sonnets, Elizabethen sonnet under Wyatt & Surrey.

Sonnet form revisited. Shakespearean sonnet themes & historicized. Commentary on Spenser & Sidney.

Assignment: Read sonnet # 18, 30, 73, 116,130 (Shakespeare's sonnets). Spenser: Selections from The Færie Queene, Sonnet # 1,75). Sidney: Selections from Astrophel and Stella (1, 31, 48).

Reading journal #2 reminder. Due 10/19.

Week 9:

10/17: Discuss sonnets.

Assignment: Read and revisit class notes.

10/19: Discussion on sonnets continued. Brief lecture on Ben Jonson (revisit earlier class lecture on Jonsonian drama).

Assignment: Read Jonson (Norton 331).

10/21: Discuss reading. Introduction to Metaphysical poetry. Characteristics, themes.

Assignment: Read poetry of Donne (Norton 293, 296, 306, 320); Herbert (Norton 375, 379); Marvell (Norton 475, 478).

Week 10:

10/24: Discuss reading. Brief lecture on John Milton & Protestant Movement.

Assignment: Reading *Paradise Lost* (Norton 421-422). Be prepared for possible unannounced quiz.

10/26: Lecture only on The Restoration Period (1660-1710).

10/28: Introduce the Age of Romanticism: characteristics & beliefs.

Assignment: Read: Blake (Norton 734, 743, 744); Wordsworth (Norton 765); Coleridge (Norton 809).

Week 11:

10/31: Discussion on reading. Topic of Essay # 2 given out.

Assignment: Read: Byron (Norton 834); Shelley (Norton 870, 876); Keats (Norton 935, 938, 939). Start thinking about essay #2; be prepared to share thoughts in class. Essay # 2 due 11/07.

11/02: Class discussion. Lecture on the poems due for the reading assignment.

Assignment: Read Tennyson Ulysses (Norton 992), Crossing the Bar (Norton 1008). Browning: Porphyria's Lover (Norton 1009), My Last Duchess (Norton 1012).

11/04: Introduction & lecture on the Victorian Period (1800-1901); discussion on the poems read for assignment.

Week 12:

11/07: Discussion the poetry of Matthew Arnold (Norton 1088,

1101). Class reading & lecture.

Assignment: Read: Christina Rossetti (Norton 1128), Thomas Hardy (Norton 1155), G. M. Hopkins (Norton 1167).

11/09: Essay #2 due. Discuss reading. Revisit earlier class lecture on modern & contemporary periods. Yeats (Norton 1191, 1199); Frost (Norton 1232, 1237).

Assignment: Read: T.S.Eliot (Norton 1340); Wilfred Owen (Norton 1389); Langston Hughes (Norton 1433, 1435); W. H. Auden (Norton 1471).

11/11: Discuss reading. Discuss characteristic & themes in the poetry of: Blunden (Norton 1405); Spender (Norton 1505).

Assignment: Read: Dylan Thomas (Norton 1567, 1572); Allen Ginsberg (Norton 1713).

Week 13:

11/14: Discuss reading. Lecture & themes on characteristics of the poetry of Thom Gunn (Norton 1769); Adrienne Rich (Norton 1796); Ted Hughes (Norton 1812).

Assignment: Read and revise class notes.

11/16: Discuss reading. Lecture on the postcolonial poets: A.K. Ramanujan (Norton 1801); Derek Walcott (Norton 1820).

11/18: Continue lecture. Discuss poems of Sylvia Plath (Norton 1843); Margaret Atwood (Norton 1894); Seamus Heaney (1906, 1907).

Assignment: Revisit class notes. Be prepared for possible quiz

following thanksgiving.

Week 14:
