Welcome to English 101: Composition and Rhetoric, a three-credit class in your required curriculum. The purpose of English 101 is to help you develop your abilities as a reader, writer, and thinker of texts. The West Virginia University English 101 Faculty has developed our own unique text *Work in Progress* with specific course goals which guide our teaching and your learning. Each unit has a specific course goal that corresponds with a paper but, of course, these goals apply to all the work you will complete in English 101. You will be expected to write four papers. The Multi-Angle Personal Narrative will focus on *learning processes*. The Feature Article will focus on *knowing contexts*. The Text Analysis will focus on *thinking critically*, and the Stakeholder Research Paper will focus on *knowing the rules*. I look forward to working with each of you this semester!

Policies and Procedures.

- Attendance. You are responsible for coming to class on time, prepared, and ready to discuss the course work. If you must miss class due to illness, injury, personal emergency, concert, required university activities, birthday, or religious observances, you are responsible for the assignments, handouts, and material that you missed. You are expected to stay for the entire duration of the class. If you leave early, I reserve the right to mark you absent for the day. There is no such thing as an excused absence, so use your absences wisely! For MWF courses, you are allowed up to three absences without penalty. The fourth absence will affect your grade up to one full letter. Each subsequent absence will decrease your grade by one full letter grade. Students who miss six classes will fail the course.
