Introduction

Welcome to English 102! This course is designed to build on the writing abilities you learned in English 101 (or the equivalent) by emphasizing research and argument and giving even greater attention to revision and organization strategies to meet the specific needs of an audience and purpose. Throughout the semester, we will explore through writing exercises the diverse communities of which you and your peers are a part.

Course Goals

This course fulfills Objective 1 of the General Education Curriculum at West Virginia University—to communicate effectively in English. English 102 accomplishes this through five course-specific goals:

- 1. Demonstrate rhetorical knowledge
- 2. Develop processes for research and writing
- 3. Demonstrate critical thinking through exploration and evaluation
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge of writing conventions
- 5. Develop knowledge of writing in digital environments.

Grade Breakdown

10% — Participation (promptness, engagement in class activities/materials, attentiveness, etc.)

20% — Informal Writing, Presentation, and Other Homework

70% — Portfolio

The primary method of assessment in this course is the portfolio. Under a portfolio system, you will not receive any definitive grades on your formal writings until the final portfolio. Instead, I will offer you formative feedback at each Final for Now (FFN) due date. It is your responsibility to continue revising, editing, and proofreading all FFNs until you turn in the final portfolio.

At midterm, you will submit a working portfolio. I will assess your progress thus far in the course. Keep in mind that at midterm I will only be able to assess approximately 20% of the total amount of work that you will produce for the final portfolio. Midterm grades do not directly correlate to final grades but are a rough approximation of what is possible for you to achieve in the course at your current trajectory.

All assignments will be collect via eCampus except for the Midterm and Final Portfolios or unless otherwise noted in class.
