We will also discuss how issues have changed and ways to find common ground with these contemporary issues. We will learn effective researching strategies. Subtopics will allude to the inevitability of human drama.

You will also be graded on your class participation; this will be 20% of your grade. In order to receive a good participation grade, you must do more than show up. I expect, and look forward to, your thoughtful contributions to class discussions, your researched debates, your effective presentations.

Absence/Tardiness Policy

You are allowed three absences. On your fourth absence, your grade will be compromised as much as one full letter, and on your sixth absence, according to policy you will fail the course. Please use your absences wisely, as excuses are not accepted. If you do have to miss class, you are responsible for obtaining any handouts or assignments you may miss. If you are worried about meeting a deadline or missing a class, make sure you talk with me in advance.

If you are not here when I take attendance, you are considered tardy. This applies if you miss one minute of class or twenty. Three bouts of tardiness counts as one absence. Students should not have to wait for other students who are late, and I should not have to repeat myself when the stragglers arrive.

Conferences

Several times throughout the course, class will be cancelled for individual conferences with me. These conferences will last 10-15 minutes and are something you should prepare for. They are a critical step in the writing process, which is why if you miss your conference, it counts as two absences. Keep track of when, and where, your conferences are. They will be held in my office or at Black Bear on Pleasant Street. Crude, yet accurate, maps drawn on the board to follow.

Communication/Community

The phone number is listed for messages only. The best way to get in contact with me is through email, and I will get back to you within 48 hours. I check my email Monday through Friday, once a day. Communication is essential to this class. Please ask questions whenever they arise, and make sure your email account is active.

Classroom community is also very important to me. We will be having discussions, debates, presentations, and so on. Please don't let this make you nervous. While this class is meant to challenge you, I also want it to be fun. I just don't believe in a class where the teacher lectures the whole session. So, get to know the names of the people sitting around you. Participate. It makes the time fly and it's a lot more interesting.

- Turn off your cell phone when you come to this class. It is disrespectful, and distracting, to have phones ring during class. If you need to keep your phone on, let me know before class starts. Also, no texting or checking your phone, for whatever reason, during class. I reserve the right to lower your participation grade if you pay more attention to your phone than the class.

- Turn your work in on time. I do not accept late work. Only typed, paper copies of assignments will be accepted. No emailed assignments, please.
